CONFERENCE CALL

s we approach the 21st century, working-class, democratic, left and socialist activists stand at a crossroads. The choices and actions socialists and others on the left make have the potential to influence the course of the 1992 elections and to help shape the social and political movements in our country for decades to come. The times require us to tackle anew both the theory and strategy for social change. We urgently need to discuss, probe and debate the grave challenges facing humankind and to plan and to act together to assure a better future for working people and our communities.

Such developments as the rise of the ultra-right and racism in developed capitalist countries, the growing strength of transnational corporations, the crisis of socialism and the ending of the cold war require that we reexamine the reality we confront, reconsider questions of strategy, alliances, organization and goals.

No clearly marked trail lies before us. We must be willing to blaze new paths to guarantee a better and more just social system.

The discussion should be open and probing. Let us exchange views in an atmosphere which will advance mutual understanding and cooperation.

While the working class in our country is becoming larger and more diversified, it has been under ferocious assault by the forces of capitalist reaction. The changed situation caused by the development of transnational corporations and the globalization of the economy challenges the trade union movement. Poverty, inequality, unemployment and homelessness are growing. The proportion of workers who are organized has been shrinking. Our country can only be turned onto the path of progress by working people organizing themselves, becoming more united and influential, and by their organizations leading in the struggle for democracy and economic and social rights.

The special oppression of African Americans – under slavery and since – in the history of U.S. capitalism has placed the African American people's freedom movement at the center of the struggle for social progress for all. In our increasingly multiracial, multinational, multicultural society, we urgently need to discuss how to accelerate the people's movements for full empowerment, democracy and equality for African Americans, Mexican Americans/Chicanos, Puerto Ricans, Caribbean Americans, Asian and Pacific Island peoples, Native American Indians, people of Middle Eastern origin. The struggles against racism, discrimination and anti-Semitism require new levels of united action.

Women's equality is one of the fundamental democratic questions of the age. The unique role played by women in the struggle for quality education, health care, equal pay, the welfare of children – in every area – is critically important. Sexism, stereotyping and the attack on women's reproductive rights are on the cutting edge of the ultra-right's agenda. But securing an equal position for women in the workplace, home and community and in political life is intrinsic to any viable vision of a just society.

The challenges before us are many. We must explore how to:

 Abolish nuclear weapons, dismantle the military-industrial complex, eliminate war and military interventions as instruments of our country's foreign policy and demilitarize and convert our economy to peaceful production.

- Unite the many components of our working people and win democratic advances that empower working people in all spheres of life.
- Strengthen the left's contribution to organizing the unorganized, developing labor solidarity and uniting, building and democratizing the trade union movement.
- Investigate the current stage of capitalism, including the globalization of economic life and the scientific revolution, and their implications for people's movements.
- Build coalitions with the power to confront the control of transnational corporations over our economy and political life, to guarantee workers' right to organize and to secure decent housing, health care, education and employment as fundamental human rights.
- Defend democratic institutions and civil liberties; rebuff the ultra-right assault against civil and human rights; secure the rights of people without regard to race, gender, age, sexual orientation, religion or disability; defend the rights of immigrants, with and without documents.
- Secure the future of the planet from the ecological destruction threatened by blind pursuit of profit and search for patterns of economic development that are in harmony with nature.
- Strengthen cooperation, coalition, partnership and mutual respect among all left and democratic forces.
- Develop a movement with the internationalist consciousness to oppose imperialism and defend the right of every nation to peace, sovereignty, an equitable place in the world economy and the freedom to choose its own social system.
- Work on a new concept of socialism, drawing lessons from the experience of the past 75 years, rooted in and built on the American people's traditions of revolutionary and democratic struggle and the realities of today's world. Socialism is not a utopia for which a blueprint exists, but must grow out of the most urgent needs of the people of our country themselves, and be shaped and modified according to their will and needs.

Through discussion and common action we can contribute to the development of the democratic, left and socialist movements in our country. We believe it is out of a free and probing debate that the potential inherent in a Marxist critique of contemporary capitalism can most fully and effectively be developed.

The Conference will evaluate the experience of the first six months of the Committees of Correspondence. It will consider questions of the Committees' future, including organization and principles, and act on strategy, alliances, structure and program to assure their continuation and development.

We invite all people affiliated to the Committees of Correspondence and others interested in these goals to a national conference in the San Francisco Bay area, July 17-19. Let us come together, exchange ideas, and strengthen the movements for peace, justice, jobs and equality.
