BACKGROUND :

(U) On February 16, 1943, Source A furnished the Los Angeles Office with a copy of a letter addressed by Subject, as HARRY HAY, to the Chairman of the Membership Committee of the Los Angeles County Communist Party. This letter reads as follows:

*940 South Windsor Blvd, Los Angeles, California,

April 2, 1938.

Chairman, Membership Committee, Communist Party, Los Angeles, California,

Dear Comrade:

the Communist Party. I first joined the Party in the Spring of 1934, and was proposed by Bill Geer of the Hollywood Unit then known as J-5. I believe that my membership card was issued under the name of Karen Hunter. I was just past 22 at the time, and I'm afraid my allegiance a purely emotional one. The Sunday School instruction for new members by the unit, at that time, was purely perfunctory. And the policy of the unit organizer and particularly my sponsor, Bill Geer, was one of shoving the new member into action out of which they hoped to God political development would eventually spring. Unfortunately, in my case, things didn't work. The deeper I got into party work, the more questions I needed answers to. And I'm afraid the general attitude of my comrades at that time was that the things I wanted clarified, and the pointers I wanted correction and rationalization on, were clear

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(U) indications of Trotzky-ite thinking, and the less I opened my yap about those worries the better. Then, eventually and inevitably, because I was a member of the New Theatre of Hollywood whose activity was mainly agit prop, the question came up about form and content in major Theatre Productions. The actual problem was the putting on of Stevedore. I got the idea that there were enough actors in the movement who knew the business, and could train interested amateurs to complete the lists, to put on social plays that were "good theatre". My point was that a Labor Theatre was a powerful wedge in putting across the United Front with the bourgeoise who would go to see a well produced play when they would run from the sight of the New Masses. My argument was that content wasn't enough for a good show. I said that you had to have form, the discipline and the fairly wellregulated communication of the professional stage to get the content across to average bourgeoise. Well, I didn't get anywhere with my complaints. And I wasn't even well grounded enough in . party procedure to know that I could have gone from my fraction to the section, and on up, with my criticisms. So I figured that I could do more outside the party in this theatre business. So I dropped out; and eventually helped organize the Theatre Group of Hollywood, who put on Waiting for Lefty at the Hollywood Playhouse, and through them the N.T.D. Council of Los Angeles. Now, all those groups and affiliates are defunct through a lot of very obvious wrong policies and deviations from the correct line. Having lived and argued through most of these dying-outs, I see now a need for such an organization even more vitally than before. Only this time, I see how it's got to be approached, how It's got to be organized, and how it's got to be controlled. (Excuse all this yapping, but I realize this re-application is serious business. And I'm trying to imply that I can see all too clearly that, in a small way, the odorous smell of left-theatre confusions in L. A. are my fault. Because I couldn't take the gaff of hanging onto my former membership, and hammering out my own confusions.

(U) "In re-applying, I'm using a name, Mac'h Eann, which is one of the gaidhlic appendages of my own name, Harry Hay, a name I want to write under when I get better known. And I'd like to get into one of the unexposed Studio units, for the following reasons:
I'd like to get the ball rolling towards the establishment of a "labor Front Theatre to produce on a commercial basis, although a non-profit one. I think the three powerful Guilds, the Screen Actors, the writers, and directors owed to be tied into it. This I think could be done through the fractions, and a number of heretofore uncommitted members who have distinct left tendencies. The idea is generally a trade union theatre, (The Guilds, although bone fide independents, are definitely on the Trade Union trend.) pro-

- (U) ducing for activized trade union audiences the problems they want to hear about by Trade Union writers who have the right approach, as well as the facilities for investigating those problems, diraected by directors who have functional ideas about new theatre, and performed by actors who are beginning to see where the solution to their problem lies, at first, you're going to have transient players, those who come from the bottom through your theatre and go on to gilt-edged contracts. But my contention is that eventually you can weed out of the congregation of opportunisitic-actors a repertoiry of people who will be more content to work on a steady salary and get their teeth into virile, alive, parts that have guts to them, even though their pay is only the minimum afforded by equity. You've got a magnificant start in as far as audiences are concerned there are so many organizations that can be activised, perhaps even the trade union locals can be persuaded to subscribe for seats on . certain nights of the month. And once you get a theatre that s playing good shows to enthusiastic audiences for three or four weeks. it's only a matter of time until the jaded bourgeoise finds itself coming at least once for each day:
 - cerning this matter in a letter. However, I think it is easily seen that such a project being put over could give the cultural front a tremendous prestige that could in time be expanded to a greater part of the west coast. Such an organization, for instance, could give tremendous impetus to recreational laboratory-theatres, and agit prop theatre workshops, as well as inter-racial groups, through their cooperation and support. For these reasons I'd like to get into one of the studio units because there I'd be working with people who know the professional theatre with its successful mass approaches, such as those formed in New York, and its problems. And for my mass organization affiliation, I'd like to be assigned to the Cultural Commission and help make that a living vital thing.
 - (U) "I took a study class in beginner's economics, the people's front, and the party, from Sam Gelfan at Jack Frankl's house. So for reference, although I would not be entering any of their units perhaps, I suggest Cybel Hallam (or Platky), Ethel Holmstock, Miriam Holtz, Harry Tarnow, Sam Gelfan, or Kate Adler at the Twenteith Century Bookshop.

On March 22, 1943, Source B advised the writer that she

had attended a Communist Party meeting the previous day, from approximately 10:00 A.M. to 2:00 P.M., at the home of Los Angeles. Source B advised that this was a meeting of the Joe. Hill Branch of the Henry Eaton Section of the Los Angeles County Communist Party, and that sixteen people were present at this meeting. The meeting. was presided over by one who stated that she had taken the place on the Section Executive Committee of a man who had recently joined delivered a talk which dealt mostly with union actthe Army. ivities, and also advised each person present that they must have a recruit for the Communist Party by May 18, 1943, the date set for the end of the current membership drive. At this meeting, Source B was introduced to Subject as HARRY HAY, and was told that Subject would be the Branch Educational Director until June. On this occasion, Subject advised informant that he. had been in the Communist Party for a long time. On April 5, 1943, Source B advised the writer that she had attended a meeting on April 4, 1943, of the Joe Hill Branch of the Henry Eaton Section of the Los Angeles County Communist Party. Source B advised that this meeting was held at the home of who:lived Los Angeles. This meeting lasted from approximately 11:00 A.M. to 2:30 P.M. The principal speaker was Subject, who delivered a talk on the city elections, and during his talk named the best candidates, cincluding LaRUE McCORMICK, FAYE ALLEN, one LARRABEE, and Judge ROTH, who, Subject stated, was quite progressive. The Chairman of this meeting, according to Source B, was Before the meeting. Membership Secretary, filled out a membership book for the informant. and each member present paid his or her April dues, amounting to \$1.25. to

On April 19, 1943, Source B advised that she had attended a meeting of the Joe Hill Branch of the Henry Eaton Section, Ios Angeles County Communist Party, on April 18, 1943, again at the home of On this occasion Source B was again advised that Subject was Branch Educational Director, and also a member of the Section Executive Committee. Subject gave his resume of the city elections, discussed the Dilworth Bill, how to get union members, and also discussed the Communist Party May Day Carnival, to be held on May 2, 1943. Subject announced that a meeting on the carnival would be held on Wednesday night, April 21, 1943, and requested any members who had any talent along entertainment lines to come to this meeting.

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Subject also announced that the next meeting would be held at his home, at 2238 Lakeshore Drive, Los Angeles, and gave his telephone number as Normandie 7994. Subject stated that the meeting at his home would be called at about 11:00 A.M., and would be rather brief, as all members would then go to the Communist Party May Day picnic. At this meeting Subject advised. Source B that he had been Educational Director for the Artists and Writers Branch during 1938-1939. Source B advised that recruits for the Communist Party were discussed at this meeting, and announced that he had two recruits who were not aircraft workers, and that one of them was a stated that the writer wanted to go to Russia after writer. the war to write for the Soviet Government, but that Subject explained to Ithat this was, not desired by the Soviet Covernment, and that the writer should be advised to stay in the United States. On May 4, 1943, Source B advised that she had attended a meeting of the Joe Hill Branch of the Henry Eaton Section, los Angeles County Communist Party, on May 2, 1943, at the home of Subject, 2238 Lakeshore Drive, Ios Angeles, California. This meeting lasted from approximately 11:00 A.M. to 1:00 P.M. Source B advised that she was introduced at this meeting to Subject's wife ANITA, who, however, left the room before the meeting of the Joe Hill Branch, began. Source B described Subject's wife ANITA as tall, bigboned, Black hair, blue eyes, course features. Source B advised that the meeting was conducted by who stated that the Joe Hill Branch was to have a new officer, to be known as Union Coordinator, who would keep the branch posted on all union activities and advise of any special jobs that the union needed assistance with. Source B stated that so spoke at this meeting, and reprimanded the branch for having obtained a few recruits only for the Communist Party during the membership drive. Source B advised at this meeting the hat was passed to take up a collection; announced that the Ios Angeles Communist Party advertisements in the Los Angeles Times and the May Day pamphlets were very expensive, and that, therefore, this collection was necessary. also announced that classes for new members would be held beginning May 9, 1943. Source B stated that during the meeting, Subject several times asked the members to lower their voices, saying that the people next door were staunch Republicans, and that all members present would probably have their noses counted as they left the house. also made an announcement that there would be a reception on May 17, 1943, for ELIZABETH GURLEY FLYNN. Source B advised that after the meeting broke up, all members present left in automobiles to attend the May Day Picnic being held that afternoon at the Tos Angeles Breakfast Club. Source B advised the writer on May 17, 1913, that she had attended a meeting of the Joe Hill Branch, Henry Eaton Section, Los Angeles County Communist Party, on May 16, 1943, at the home of L

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West Hollywood. Source B stated that this meeting lasted



from approximately 11:00 AM to 2:00 PM, and that the meeting was presided and that the election of the branch officers was held. Source B stated that made all the nominations for officers, with the exception of one, which was the nomination of by Subject. Source B stated that the nominations were all immediately seconded, and that there was no opposition. On this occasion Subject was elected Branch Educational Director. During the meeting Subject informed Source B that the County Committee had ordered that membership books should be carried to each meeting, and that the members should carefully guard against the loss of their books, as in the event of a loss, a notice must be sent to the Section Executive Committee, and if the member's explanation is not deemed satisfactory, a report must then be made to the County Committee. stated that all members should be very careful of their membership books. inasmuch as if one of them were stolen, or to get into the hands of a stooge, he might use it to attend meetings. During a conversation, Subject advised Source B that he had been reclassified IA, by his draft board. Subject also advised that "we" are organizing a union at "my" plant and added that he expected to have some good news for the members in two or three weeks, although the organization was proving to be a slow process. Source B advised that during the meeting Subject's wife ANITA remained out in the backyard, but appeared to be well acquainted with all members of the Joe Hill Branch. Source B advised that the members of the Joe Hill Branch were hysterical with joy over the motion picture MISSION TO MOSCOW. Subject requested the members to urge their unions to make requests of neighborhood theaters to ask for a showing of the picture. Subject also requested the members to have their unions write to Warner Brothers Studios congratulating them on the motion picture.

On June 1, 1943, Source B advised the writer that she had attended a meeting on Sunday, May 30, 19h3, at the home of West Hollywood. Source B advised that the meeting lasted from 11:00 A.M. to approximately 2:10 P.M. This meeting was presided over who made the announcement that the Joe Hill Branch had been dissolved, and that there would be no further meetings of that branch. announced that a partial assignment of the members had already been made, and in mentioning these stated that Subject had been assigned to the Midtown Section of the Los Angeles County Communist Party. During the meeting, Subject stated that he was outraged over his discharge from his position at the Interstate Aircraft and Engineering Corporation, and promised a lot of fireworks leading up to his reemployment. Subject stated that the State Labor Board had already begun interviewing all persons discharged by Interstate, and that IEO MALIACHER had already begun action in the case, and was pushing it in order to be sure that the witnesses were able to testify before being drafted. Subject stated that this was to be made a test case, and that a lawyer would be sent out from New York to work on it. Subject advised that the only persons discharged by Interstate had met on a Monday night at a union meeting. Eleven persons were supposed to attend this meeting, but only eight actually did, and these eight persons were the only ones who were discharged by Interstate. Subject also advised that the

day before he was discharged he had received administrative authority from the management of the Interstate Aircraft Plant, advising that from then on he would be in charge of his department. Subject stated that since he was discharged the next day, that he believed this was a good point in his case. Subject further stated that although Interstate had made the announcement that they intended to transfer their activities to their Eastern Branch. that the management had not asked anyone of the employees whether they would be willing to transfer East with the plant. Subject was also very angry concerning the attitude of a fellow employee of his. who was also discharged at the same time, and who was also a member of the Joe Hill Branch. Subject stated that had refused to join in pushing the case, stating that he had to go out and get another job. Subject stated that he has since been unable to contact and that if heris not able to do so soon, he intends to ask for the suspension of from the Communist Party.

On May 12, 1943, the writer ascertained that Subject is employed as a senior material planner at the Interstate Aircraft and Engineering Corporation, 3443 Wilshire Boulevard, Ios Angeles, California, that he now resides at 2238 Takeshore Drive, Los Angeles, previously resided at 514 Sixth Avenue, New York City, and was born April 7, 1912, at Worthing, Sussex, England. Also, that Subject's father and mother were citizens of the United States at the time of his birth, inasmuch as his father, HENRY: HAY, became a naturalized citizen of the United States in 1892. Further, that Subject attended Virgil Junior High School, Leland Stanford University, Palo Alto, California, from October, 1930; to April, 1932. The names of Subject's references were given as JOHN J. WILSON, 215 West Fifth Street, Los Angeles, an attorney, known for twenty years; JOSEPH DOYLE, 458 North Alta Vista Boulevard, Los Angeles, an attorney, known for ten years; BERTHA QUILL, 9207 Seventh Avenue, Inglewood, California, property owner, known for eighteen years; Dr. C. H. VON BRETON, 3580 Avenida Del Sol, North Hollywood, retired, known for twenty-three years; Dr. S. Under occupation or activity the subject stated he was presently a promotion planning consultant—plans the promotion and publicity necessary to maintain the school for Spring and Summer sessions, 1941. His employer was stated to be the New Theater Dramatic School, 110 West 17th Street, New York City, at a salary of \$25. a week; for other work engaged in, he supplied the information that he did script writing for documentary films—at present swaiting decision on a series of South American good neighbor relations. Under other occupational experience he listed that from September 7, 1940 to December 28, 1940 he was Service Manager for R. H. Macy and Company; duties, customers' pamplaints and adjustments. From March 5, 1939 to October 1, 1939, Historical Records Survey, California, Editor in Charge of Orange County; from January 7, 1936 to December 10, 1938, Research consultant and script writer—scenario technician for movie directors.

Subject further stated that he was married to ANITA/HAY, of Los Angeles, California on September 9, 1938; income earned for the last 12 months was listed as \$882.01; and an inheritance equity, not income of \$250 a year; total income in 1910 of HARRY and ANITA HAY, \$2,020. As to citizenship the subject stated he was born at Worthing, County of Sussex, England on April 7, 1912 and that he was a citizen of the United States; he further stated that he had no court record.

Under registrent's statement regarding classification subject stated he was a member of the R.O.T.C., Los Angeles High School from 1925 to 1929; graduated as senior line captain and holds candidacy for reserve commission; attending C.W.T.C., 1929.

HAY was classified 3-A on February 20, 1941; continued 3-A on September 1, 1942; reclassified to 1-A on April 13, 1943; reclassified to 2-B on April 29, 1943; continued as 2-3 on June 17, 1943.

The following letters were found to be in registrant's file:

May 1, 1912, letter from HARRY HAY to Local Board 16, on the letterhead of the Russian War Relief Association of Southern California, address Room 1201 Subway Terminal Building, 112 South Hill Street, Los Angeles, California, notifying the Board that he hadchanged his address from 512 Sixth Avenue, New York City to 2238 Lakeshore Avenue, Los Angeles, California; he further stated in this letter that mail could be addressed to him at his office, Russian War Relief of Southern California, where he was employed as a field supervisor.

There was also included a form dated July 19, 1942, entitled HARRY HAY, 2238 Lakeshore Avenue, Los Angeles, California, furnishing the following information which was made a part of his questionnaire; this listed his employer as Glendale Foundry and Alloy Company, 4910 San Fernando Road, Glendale; California, salary \$45 a week; relatives, ANITA PIATKY, wife, age 27, 2238 Lakeshore Avenue,

Los Angeles, California; MARCARET NEALL, 5h, mother, 3132 Oakcrest Drive, Los Angeles, California; MARCARET FECK, sister, age 28, 787 Mt. Washington Drive, Los Anges, California; JACK/HAY, brother, age 26, Honolulu, Cahu, T.H., employed by the Keniche Contractors, Inc.

Under other information on this form subject stated he was a moulder's assistant; expected to attend Government training school for moulders shortly, stating, our shop running on less than half production due to dearth of moulders.

On October 29, 1942 an occupational questionnaire listed subject's employer as the Interstate Aircraft and Engineering Corporation, 645 South Mariposa Avenue, Los Angeles, California; Naval aircraft plant; his duties comprised work as material planner and he began this employment on August 21, 1942.

Occupational form 12 was executed by the Interstate Aircraft and Engineering Corporation, 3143 Wilshire Hlvd., Los Angeles on February 29, 1913 for HARRY HAY, employed as a material planner; together with this form were many letters stating that Mr. HAY holds a key position with their company and that they would take his case to the Appeal Board if his Local Board did not take him out of 1-A. These letters were signed by F. H. SMITH, personnel manager, Wilshire Division.

The file contained a letter from the Interstate Aircraft and Engineering Corporation, 3443 Wilshire Boulevard, Los Angeles, to Local Board 16, advising that HARRY HAY's employment with their company was terminated on Way 26, 1943.

Local Board 16, in letter to transfer station at 333 West 2nd Street, Los Angeles, California, on June 3, 1943 advised that subject, order number 794, should be given a physical examination; examination was subsequently given and listed physical difficulty as syphilis (secondary stage) now being arrested under prescribed care of personal physician.

There was also a letter dated June 1, 1913 from IEO CALLACHER, signed by MILTON S. TYRE, 5851 Avalon Boulevard, Los Angeles, California, to Local Board 16, advising that he was writing as the attorney for HARRY HAY and that HARRY was laid off by the Interstate Aircraft and Engineering Corporation on May 26, 1913 because of a transfer of his department out of its current location. GALIAGHER stated that his office had made an investigation and found some doubt as to the company's claim and therefore his office has filed a charge against the company before the National Relations Board, 21st Region, 111 West 7th Street, Los Angeles, California, alleging that Mr. HAY's lay-off was discriminatory and in violation of the National Labor Relations, Section 8, sub-section 3. Mr. GALIAGHER asked that HAY's present classification be continued by the Local Board until the case had been decided.

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On June 8, 1943 a letter was written by Local Board 16 to MILTON S. TYRE, c/o LEO GALLACHER, 5851 Avalon Boulevard, Los Angeles, in which the Board Advised Mr. GALLACHER's office that they could not give any deferment in the matter and arrangements were then being made for the induction of HARRY HAY into military service.


Form 12-A, signed by G. E. CANNON, of Avion, Inc., 1515 East 50th Street, Los Angeles, California, dated June 11, 1913 was also found in this file and it reflected that HARRY HAY was employed by them on June 8, 1913 as a material planner in charge of non-productive material planning and control at an average pay of 561 a week. Avion, Inc. stated they were engaged as manufacturers and in engineering of aircraft assembly; also sub-contracts and experimental project for the American air forces.

In a letter from Local Board 16, dated June 19, 1943 to Avion, Inc., 4545 East 50th Street, Los Angeles, receipt is acknowledged of Form 42-A concerning HARRY HAY, Order No. 794; in this letter the Board further advised that they were continuing this registrant in 2-B until January, 1944 induction.

In a letter dated June 22, 1913 from Dr. S. J. GIASS, 1911 Wilshire Boulevard, Los Angeles, California, to Major Lenors Goerke, M.C., Selective Service System, 333 West 2nd Street, Los Angeles, California, Dr. GIASS advised that HARRY HAY has been under his treatment from May, 1938 to May, 1913 (except 30 months; interval in New York) and he did not consider the patient as cured yet.

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

subject was scheduled to be the announcer in a pageant which the Communist Party staged for this rally. He was scheduled to be the announcer for "Damn the torpedoes, full speed ahead", and took part in the rehearsals therefore. For some reason unknown to this source, the subject did not take the part of the announcer when the pageant was staged.

NELLIE M. HAFFNER checked the records of the Immigration and Naturalization Service at San Pedro, and advised that according to the records in that office, subject arrived in the United States on November 23, 1916, at San Pedro, California, aboard the S. S. Colusa, which sailed from Antofagasta, Chile, on October 26, 1916. The records further indicated that the subject's father, shenry HAY, who was born in El Monte, California, on November 24, 1869, that his last permanent address had been Chuquicamata, Chile, and that his destination was Los Angeles. Subject's mother, Mrs. MARCARET HAY, was born in Arizona on August 10, 1887. At the time of his entry into the United States, subject was four years of age. The records indicated that he was a citizen of the United States.

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advised on August 7, 1943, that Mr. JOHN WIISON, attorney, 215 West 5th St., Los Angeles, who was interviewed on July 12, 1943, stated that the subject's father was amining engineer for the Guggenhein interests and travelled all over the world. He advised that he had been acquainted with subject's father and subject since the latter's entrance into the country. Subject's father died on September 13, 1938, and WIISON acted as attorney for the estate. WIISON further stated that in 1939, subject went to New York City and remained there for some time. It was his belief that while in New York, subject became connected with a "pink group", and advised that the subject resigned therefrom when he discovered that it was Communist in tendency.

He stated that for a number of years, subject was employed in Hollywood as a ghost writer, and was also trying to do some radio script writing. In WIISON's opinion, the subject has a "flair for liberalism" and is a "philosophical type of person who likes to dig into things." WIISON understands that the subject was discharged from the Interstate Corp. because of some money-saving plan which he submitted. He regarded subject as one who was loyal to this country and is zealous in his desire to help the war effort.

This informant further advised regarding subject's dismissal from the Interstate Aircraft and Engineering Co., 3443 Wilshire Blvd., Los Angeles, that his dismissal, together with that of several other employees at that plant, resulted in the institution of action for reinstatement before the National Labor Relations Board, which action is still pending.

This informant further interviewed Mrs. (ECRCE A: DANIELS, 2232 lake—shore Avenue, Ios Angeles, California, who advised that the subject and his wife have resided in that neighborhood for more than a year. She regarded subject and his wife as fine, respectable neighbors, very quiet, who have very little to do with their fellow neighbors. She further stated that she has never had any reason to question subject's loyalty to this country, and that as far as she knows, he was not connected with any organization, politically or otherwise.

Informant advised further that information had been received that the subject was reputed to have been the labor organizer of the United Office and Professional Workers of America, and that at ameeting held in los Angeles, subject was the principal speaker on the topic of "City Elections". It was further indicated that approximately ten years ago, subject was a charter member of the Trail Finders, a boy's hiking and camping organization of Altadena, California.

The records at the Hall of Records, Los Angeles County, Book 1541, Page 55, reflect that the subject was married on September 9, 1938, to ANITA PLATKY. At that time, his address was listed as 940 South Windsor Blwd., Ios Angeles, and he stated that he had been born in Worthing, Sussex, England, and listed his occupation as writer. His father was stated to have been born in New Zeeland and his mother in Arizona. ANITATPIATKY listed her age as twenty-three and her address at that time was 620g North Vendome Avenue. She stated that she was born in New Jersey and that her father, IEON PLATKY, was born in Germany and her mother, ANNIE ROSENWASSER, in New York City.

The records of the Los Angeles City College reflected that the subject's wife, under the name of ANITA PLATKY, attended that school from September, 1931, to June, 1933. It was indicated that she was born on November 13, 1914, in Newark, New Jersey, and attended the Asbury Park High School in that city and also the Beverly Hills High School, Beverly Hills, from which she graduated in June, 1931. In 1931, her address was listed as 356 South Cloverdale, and the following addresses also appeared in the records: 3215 West 6th Street, and 641 South Berendo.

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The records at the Frank Wiggen Trade School reflected the subject's wife, Mrs. ANNA HAY, has been a resident in Los Angeles since 1929, and that in January 4, 1943, was unemployed, although it was indicated that she had probably been employed as a secretary. The records at the Registrar of Voters, Ios Angeles County, reflect that subject set forth his occupation as "production control", and he registered as affiliated with the Democratic Party.

The records of the Retail Merchants Credit Association reflect no credit record for the subject at Los Angeles, although a report from New York City, dated September 15, 1942; indicated that he was an architect by profession and that he was regarded as a satisfactory tenant while in New York City, at 542 6th Avenue, where he resided for approximately two years. It appeared further that the subject maintained a checking account at the Security First National Bank, Fifth and Spring Street Branch, in Los Angeles, and that the balance varied from \$100 to \$300.



This investigation is predicated upon information furnished the Los Angeles Field Division by Sources A and B to the effect that the subject who had been affiliated with the Communist movement in Los, Angeles County for several years is presently affiliated with the Echo Park Communist Political Association. These sources advised that the subject's wife, ANITA HAY, who has also been associated with the Communist movement in the Los Angeles area for several years is at the present time assigned to the Echo Park Club of the

It was also determined through this interview that the subject and his wife continued to reside at 2328 Cove Avenue, Los Angeles.



At this convention, according to Source "B", it was decided that the State organization should adopt the proposed resolutions of the National Convention thereby changing the organization from a political association to the old time Communist principles. It was also decided that the organization should henceforth be known as the Communist Party and that various organizational changes should be effected throughout the Los Angeles County Clubs, thereby paralleling the original Communist ideologies as advanced by CARL MARX and LENIN.

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(U) 1946 and 1947, has been in the Communist Party for eight years, and is a member of the United Automobile Workers Union. advised that he has observed subject in attendance at meetings of the Echo Park Club of the Communist Political Association on several occasions. Subject was observed to attend meetings on August 16, 1945, September 20, 1945, October 18, 1945, and November 1, 1945, all of which meetings were held at 1004 Echo Park Boulevard, Los Angeles, California. also observed subject in attendance at meetings of the Echo Park Communist Club on January 3, 1946, and January 31, 1946, held at 1309 Mohawk Street, Los Angeles, California. (U) was able to confirm the subject's presence at the meeting on October 18, 1945, and in addition observed subject in attendance at a meeting of the Echo Park Club of the Communist Political Association on November 15, 1945, held at 1004 Echo Park Avenue, Los Angeles. CL (U) also advised that a meeting of the Thirteenth Congressional District Section of the Los Angeles County Communist Party was held in Carpenters Union Hall on Santa Monica Boulevard, Los Angeles, California, on April 1, 1946. According to this informant, HARRY HAY was in attendance at this meeting. attended an open meeting of the Communist Party held at the Shrine Auditorium, Los Angeles, on August 15, 1946. About thirtyeight hundred people were present, and among those present the informant identified the subject. advised that he attended a series of classes in "Marxism" conducted for the Hawthorne Club of the Communist Party during the latter part of 1946. The instructor of these classes was identified by the informant as HARRY HAY.

At a meeting on August 19, 1946, held at 13027 Yukon Avenue, Hawthorne, California, HAY classified the class struggle into four groups. He said that of these groups the factory workers were the only group capable of leading a revolution. The reason for this is because they are well organized and have nothing to lose. This group would be best led by the Communist Party. However, even with Communist leadership the unions are politically limited because the members vote as individuals. HAY pointed out that the most exploited are the sharecroppers, but even they are subject to individual thinking, hoping to someday own property.

HAY pointed out that the factory workers are a small percentage of the population, but this is no setback because in Russia at the time of the Revolution there were only three million Communists. HAY stated that the Communist assignment of today is to join unions and various other groups to instruct as to the successful overthrow of capitalism. also attended a class in Marxism at which HAY was the instructor held on September 4, 1946, at 13015 Shoup Avenue, Hawthorne, California. The subject under discussion was "Imperialist, Monopoly, Capitalism". This informant said that HAY berated such firms as General Electric, Standard Oil, and Standard Brands as enemies of the workers and criticized these firms for their fascist agitation. also attended meetings of the Marxist class conducted by HAY on September 11, 1946, and October 2, 1946. The original notes of this informant are being retained in the Los Angeles files. Los Angeles T-2 advised that she was formerly a member of the Thirteenth CD Communist Club in Los Angeles, and during 1947 there was a class on Marxism held in private homes. This class was conducted by HARRY HAY and attended by members of the Thirteenth CD Club and Fiftyfourth AD Club of the Communist Party. Dear Sir:

A review of the files at the Bureau in connection with this subject has revealed that a report has not been received from your office concerning the subject since the report of Special Agent John M. Cashel dated 11-6-45 at Ins Angeles. California.

While it is realized that existing instructions do not require that a report be submitted periodically on Security Index card subjects unless the subject is also a top functionary, it is felt that in view of the tense international situation at the present time, a new report should be submitted setting forth the extent of the subject's present activities in connection with the Communist Party and related groups in order that the Bureau will be in possession of current information concerning each one of those subjects who are considered a threat to the internal security.

In submitting the report, the Bureau desires that you incorporate in summary form the information contained in your files not previously reported. Information of substantive nature only should be set forth and repetitious material should be avoided. Where a description of the subject has not been reported, that, too, should be included in the report and also placed on the reverse side of the Security Index card in accordance with the instructions outlined in SAC Letter No. 57, Series 1948, dated April 10, 1948.

In the event the subject's current address is not the same as that which appears on the Security Index card, you should correct the Security Index card and forward Form FD-119 to the Bureau in order that the Security Index card at the Bureau can be corrected.

In order that the Security Index will contain only the names of those individuals who can be considered to be a threat to the internal security of this country, the Bureau desires that you carefully appraise this case and if it appears that the subject, based on his present position and activities or past position and activities, cannot be considered such a threat, then in addition to submitting the report, you should recommend that the Security Index card be canceled.
